Community Agreements

- 1 - We will honor the traditions and cultures involved - including those who have made, and are still making dolls for other communities.
- 2 - The intention is to educate the public, create awareness of violent acts committed by agents in our communities, and support those most impacted by these raids and actions.
- 3 - We will not work outside our capacity, or knowledge.
- 4 - This is a NON-VIOLENT protest, and as such we will not put ourselves or any community at risk with our actions.
- 5 - We will use available skills, resources or networks as much as possible to grow this project while keeping the tenets of mutual aid at the forefront by not purchasing supplies or spending money where it does not need to be spent to further our protest.
- 6 - We recognize that activism takes many forms and we will support anyone working within the space in alignment with our goals and agreements.
